2010 Gesell Developmental Observation (GDO) Study Outcomes: Frequently Asked Questions (FAQ)

For the last two years, Gesell Institute of Human Development has coordinated a national effort to collect baseline and exploratory data on the Gesell Developmental Observation (GDO) ©2007. Schools from around the country were recruited in 2008-2010 to participate in the GDO study. Data has been collected from a diverse sample of over 1,350 children, families, and teachers.

The new data will provide current information and updated trends indicating what children can and cannot do at various developmental stages. New products and materials for the GDO are currently under development based on this data, and a number of questions have come up from our customers, friends, and colleagues. 
About Gesell Institute

NurtureShock: New Thinking About Children Authors – and Fall 2010 LEAD Conference supporters – in Newsweek!



Po Bronson and Ashley Merryman, authors of the award-winning book *NurtureShock*, recently wrote an article for *Newsweek* on the science of creativity. The main article, entitled "The Creativity Crisis," is about how our national strategy for creativity development is lacking. They report that researcher Kyung Hee Kim of the College of William and Mary recently analyzed 300,000 creativity scores – and found that American creativity scores have been dropping since 1990.

The good news is that creativity is teachable and learnable!

In a side article, "Forget Brainstorming," Bronson and Merryman offer tips for boosting creativity among individuals.

Merryman will be a keynote speaker at Gesell Institute's 60th Anniversary banquet as well as a panel member for the LEAD Conference in October!
